


[&]quot;Mimi, how would you like to go to a new home?" she asked.

[&]quot;But I already had a mother and father..." said Mimi. "How can I have another mother and father?"



"Only after you have spent some time with them, and you think you would like to go and live with them, will I send you to their home," explained Mrs. Bear.



"Don't cry, we don't mean to make you feel sad or scared," said Mrs. Giraffe, gently patting her.


"Why don't we just play a game and get to know each other a little first," suggested Mr. Giraffe.






